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

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1. Introduction to the study

Background and methodology



- The Young Persons' Alcohol and Tobacco Survey has been conducted in the North West every two years since 2005.
- Fieldwork for the latest survey took place between January and April 2017.
- The survey questionnaire was largely the same as that used in previous surveys to enable tracking of results. Additional questions about e-cigarettes were included this year.
- We encouraged pupils to be open and honest when completing the questionnaires, and assured them that all responses would be treated confidentially.

Questionnaire format



- 20 Trading Standards Services in the North West participated in the 2017 survey. Each assumed responsibility for the distribution of the survey in their own Local Authority area.
- Schools were given the option to administer the survey either online or on paper. The majority of respondents chose the latter option.
- A total of 9173 questionnaires were completed (sample breakdown is included in the Appendix), of which 82 were from Wirral Local Authority.
- Mustard assumed responsibility for collating and verifying all the data and information provided, and producing a report summarising the key research findings. Separate local authority area reports are also being produced to inform local understanding and initiatives.
- This report summarises the results for Wirral Local Authority to inform local understanding and initiatives. Results are compared against those from previous years, although you did not participate in the study in 2015.





2. Current trends


Drinking alcohol seems to be losing appeal among young people.

At a national level, smoking also seems to be falling out of favour amongst the population as a whole. Quit rates have increased and cigarette sales are down.

1 in 6 UK adults now smoke, the lowest level

ever seen

Public Health England September 2016 2.5 million people tried to give up smoking last year. Of those 2.5 million would-be quitters, **One in five succeeded** – the bestever rate. That was up from the 13.6% success rate seen as recently as 2010.

3. Alcohol consumption amongst young people in Wirral

Key Headlines - Alcohol Consumption

Results suggest young people in the Wirral are drinking more frequently

A quarter claim to be drinking alcohol once a week or more and fewer claim to be not drinking at all. The sample profile, however, is older than in 2013.


The majority of young people in the Wirral identified themselves as infrequent binge drinkers

Approximately 1 in 8 claimed to be regular binge drinkers, which is low in comparison to 4 years ago given the older age profile of this year's sample.

The percentage of young people in the Wirral claiming to drink in pubs and clubs has increased

Again this reflects the older age profile of respondents surveyed in the Wirral compared to the North West overall, which is more weighted towards 14-15 year olds. The regional results show that where young people choose to drink alcohol has changed significantly over the last 10 years, with more drinking at home or in their friends' homes under parental supervision.


Frequency of alcohol consumption




Frequency of binge drinking



Alcohol consumption levels




In a typical week, how many units of alcohol do you drink?

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Key Headlines – Purchasing Alcohol



Young people are mainly getting alcohol from family


A relatively higher percentage in the Wirral are buying alcohol from pubs, clubs and off-licences, reflecting the older age profile of your sample

A significantly higher percentage of young people in the Wirral claim to be buying alcohol themselves

Again this reflects the older age profile of respondents compared to four years ago. Results are similar for males and females in your area

Where young people get their alcohol






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Where young people get their alcohol

5. Alcohol attitudes, behaviour and understanding

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Key Headlines – Attitudes, Behaviour and Understanding

No significant shift in attitudes to drinking alcohol amongst young people in the Wirral

Whereas in the North West overall young people appear to becoming more sensible towards alcohol. Attitudes towards drinking do change significantly amongst 17 year olds, which explains why we have not seem the same shift in attitudes in the Wirral.

Clear differences in behaviour in the Wirral by gender


Young girls are more conscious of the need to drink in groups and more concerned about their drinks being spiked.

Young people's understanding of legislation in the Wirral have not changed significantly

Were more likely to correctly answer questions regarding whether it was a criminal offence to drink and buy alcohol compared to the region as a whole.

Attitudes to drinking alcohol









Behaviour when drinking alcohol (1)











6. Smoking behaviour

Key headlines – Smoking behaviour

The percentage of young people in the Wirral claiming to smoke has increased

Those who do smoke are mainly smoking 5 or less cigarettes a week, or are only smoking when they drink alcohol.

Fewer are starting to smoke at a younger age

Approaching a quarter of those who have smoked claimed that they first started aged 13 or under, compared to two-fifths 4 years ago.

They mostly get cigarettes from their friends or try to buy themselves

Where they buy themselves it tends to be from local off licences and shops, or they get adults to buy them.

A low percentage of smokers claim to have bought illicit cigarettes


Much lower than reported for the North West overall, although the sample size is relatively low.



Smoking behaviour





Starting to smoke






How old were you when you first started or tried smoking?


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Illicit Cigarettes

7. E-cigarettes

Key headlines - E-cigarettes

More than half of young people in the Wirral claimed to have tried e-cigarettes

More evident amongst young males in the region.

Almost a third of young people in the Wirral tried e-cigarettes before real cigarettes

This is similar to the North West region as a whole.


Mostly getting e-cigarettes from friends

Relatively lower numbers are buying themselves, and where they are it is mostly from off-licences and local shops.




Which of the following best describes your experience of e-cigarettes?





Appendix 1 Sample Breakdown by Local Authority




